1. SCOPE: The following terms and conditions shall prevail unless otherwise modified by contracting agencies within this bid document. We reserve the right to accept or reject any or all bids received.

2. DEFINITIONS AS USED HEREIN:

- a. The term "bid request" means a solicitation of a formal sealed bid.
- b. The term "bid" means the price offered by the bidder.
- c. The term "bidder" means the offer or vendor.
- d. The term "County/City/Township" means Douglas County, Kansas, City of Lawrence, City of Eudora, City of Baldwin, City of Ottawa or Wakarusa Township.
- e. The term "Board of County Commissioners or "BoCC" means the governing body of each respective county, "Board of City Commissioners" means the governing body of each respective city, "Township Board" means the governing body of Wakarusa Township.
- 3. COMPLETING BID: Bids must be submitted only on the forms (or reproductions thereof) provided in this document. All information must be legible. Any and all corrections and/or erasures must be initialed. Each bid sheet must be signed by the authorized bidder and required information must be provided.
- 4. CONFIDENTIALITY OF BID INFORMATION: Each bid must be sealed and submitted in an envelope clearly marked "HIGHWAY DE-ICING SALT" to provide confidentiality of the bid information prior to the bid opening. Supporting documents and/or descriptive literature may be submitted with the bid. Do not indicate bid prices on literature.

- 7. ADDENDA: All changes in connection with this bid will be issued in the form of a written addendum. Signed acknowledgment of receipt of each addendum must be submitted with the bid.
- 8. LATE BIDS, CHANGES OR WITHDRAWALS: Bids received after the deadline designated in this bid document shall not be considered and shall be returned unopened.
 - Bids may be changed or withdrawn prior to the bid opening. All such transaction must be submitted in writing and received by the County Clerk's Office prior to the bid deadline. Changes or withdrawals may be made after the bid deadline only with the approval of the Board of County Commissioners, the Board of City Commissioners, or Township Board, as appropriate. After bid opening, no changes in bid prices or other provisions of bids prejudicial to the interest of the County/City/Township of fair competition shall be permitted.
- 9. BIDS BINDING: All bids submitted shall be binding upon the bidder if accepted within thirty (30) calendar days after the bid opening.

13. METHOD OF AWARD AND NOTIFICATION: Each entity will evaluate bids as a separate agency and award their bids independently of the others based solely on the lowest and best, responsive and responsible bidder(s) whose bid conforms to the specifications and whose bid is considered to be the best value in the opinion of the County/City/Township.

The County/City/Township reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids and any part of a bid; to waive informalities, technical defects, and minor irregularities in bids received; and, to award the bid on a item by item basis, by specified groups of items or to consider bids submitted on an "all or nothing" basis if the bid is clearly designated as such or when it is determined to be in the best interest of the County/City/Township.

The signed bid shall be considered an offer on the part of the bidder; such offer shall be deemed accepted upon issuance by the County/City/Township of a Purchase Order or other contractual document.

- 15. DATE: April 16, 2014

Public Works has funds allocated in Equipment Reserve to purchase two dump trucks; both equipped with a dump bed, spreader, plow, and pre-wet system for snow and ice control.

The dump trucks are used daily in the maintenance of county roads and bridges, as well as, performing snow and ice control in winter months. The new dump trucks will replace two 2004 International models; one has 191,805 miles and the second has 208,054 miles. One of these models is operating and the other has broken rings in the motor with an estimated replacement cost of \$26,000. These existing models will be sold through our online auction.

The cab and chassis for the dump trucks are available on the 2014 MACPP regional vehicle contracts that the county participated in. Special equipment (dump bed, spreader, plow, and pre-wet system) is provided by a sole source provider, American Equipment through the truck dealership.

For many years we have purchased International dump trucks off this contract. Over the past three years we started experiencing problems with this model where the exhaust filters plug up which has resulted in additional repair cost. Staff tried to resolve this issue with the authorized dealer but was unsuccessful in finding a solution. Unfortunately, this issue has become an unsolved problem nationwide.

The contracts developed from the MACPP bid are awarded to multiple dealerships who meet the required specifications then it is up to each participating entity to determine which contract best meets their needs. As staff looked at the four models with contracts, it became apparent that the Mack dump truck was better equipped than the other models. Below are some differences the Mack truck offers value to their operation:

1. The cab & chassis has more standard options than the comparable models. It was difficult to compare as some require you to purchase optional equipment, or some did not offer the functions at all.

- 2. Mack offers 24/7 availability on parts which could impact staff's response when responding to snow/ice removal or an emergency.
- 3. Mack provides onsite service under warranty. This would save significant staff time to haul equipment to and from for service.
- 4. Warranty coverage with the Mack truck is substantially better and would result in cost savings.
- 5. The recommendation for Mack preventative service (oil change, filters, etc.) is every 450 hours and International requires service every 350 hours. Assuming our trucks last 10 years (200,000 miles) this would require 6 additional oil changes for the International at \$2,400 (6 x \$400) for the life of the truck, not including labor to perform the service.

In an effort to look at the cost difference, staff compared International cab and chassis models purchased last year at a base cost of \$96,428 to this year's contract with Westfall GMC, authorized dealer of Mack, base cost of \$97,708. The special equipment cost would be applicable to both dealers. While the Mack cost is higher by \$1,280, staff feels the five options identified above would offset this increase.

Doug Stephens, Gary Koehler, and I will be at the commission meeting to answer any questions you may have.

We were notified in February regarding the 7th Judicial Districts projected allocation for the SFY 2015 grant cycle. As you can see from the chart below the core programs (Juvenile Intake and KDOC programs operated by DCYS) are experiencing a loss of (\$9,718.00) from what the district received in SFY 2014. This reduction is due to a continuing decline in the ADP (average daily population) of youth served by the core programs.

At a recent KDOC Director's meeting Douglas County was recognized for its reduction of youth being served in the juvenile justice system. We were the only County that was listed in the top three Counties for both a reduction of youth in State custody and a reduction of youth assigned to JISP (Intensive Supervised Probation). From July 2008 through September 2013:

The number of Kansas youth in State custody was down 23%, over that same time period the number of Douglas County youth in State custody was down 51.28%.

The number of Kansas youth assigned to JISP (Intensive Supervised Probation) was down 18.92%, over the same time period Douglas County youth assigned to JISP was down 65.22%.

Even though we are experiencing reductions in funding we continue to be successful in keeping Douglas County youth out of the deep end of the juvenile justice system.

Prevention programs (WRAP and KU) are receiving a \$14,786.00 increase in prevention funding from last year. The increased allocation represents slightly more than those programs received in SFY 2011, so the increase can be viewed as more of a reinvestment in prevention programming rather than an increase in funding.

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A HOME RULE RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF DOUGLAS COUNTY, KANSAS EXTENDING A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON LARGE WIND ENERGY CONVERSION SYSTEMS

WHEREAS, on December 11th, 2013, the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas ("Board") adopted Home Rule Resolution No. 13-12-5 placing a temporary moratorium on Large Wind Energy Conversion Systems, and

WHEREAS, the temporary moratorium is set to expire on April 30, 2014, and

WHEREAS, the Board and applicable Douglas County officials, agencies, departments, boards, and commissions require additional time to review the Zoning Regulations, receive public input, hold public hearings, and make recommendations for amendments to the Zoning Regulations to address adverse effects that wind farms may create.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF DOUGLAS COUNTY, KANSAS, SITTING IN REGULAR SESSION, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

The temporary moratorium adopted in Home Rule Resolution No. 13-12-5 is hereby extended through and including September 30, 2014. This Resolution is effective from and after its adoption and publication one time in the official County newspaper.

SUBJECT: SNAP MATCH AT LAWRENCE FARMERS' MARKETS

SNAP (food stamps) match programs are gaining momentum throughout the country. These programs match dollar for dollar the food assistance dollars spent at farmers' markets with additional funding from private foundations or local government. SNAP, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, commonly known as food stamps, can be processed at local farmers' markets through an EBT (electronic benefit transfer) device. Dollar for dollar match programs allow those receiving SNAP to potentially double their spending money at local farmers' markets increasing their access to healthy, affordable food. These programs also offer the opportunity for economic development by supporting the local food producers that sell at the market.

Lawrence farmers' markets currently accept the Vision card which is the Kansas program for distribution of SNAP. Additionally, EBT machines are already available, which would allow for an easy transition into a dollar for dollar match program. SNAP usage at two Lawrence markets (Downtown Lawrence Farmers' Market and Cottin's Hardware Farmers' Market) last year was an estimated \$22,825. The initiation of a SNAP match program has the support of both the Downtown Lawrence Farmers' Market and the Cottin's Hardware Farmers' Market.

Benefits of this program to the community include:

- Increases access to healthy foods for low-income members of our community.
- Addresses the Lawrence Douglas County Health Roadmap Goal to increase our communities' access to healthy, local foods.
- Supports the 100+ small business, local food vendors at our area markets.
- Supports the economic development and small business retention goals of the City of Lawrence, Douglas County, and the Chamber of Commerce.
- Supports the Douglas County Food Policy Council initiatives to support small farms and increase food access.
- Helps to build relationships in the community around food by breaking down some of the social stigmas around SNAP and addressing price perceptions of the farmers' markets.

Recommendation:

Partner with the City of Lawrence, Douglas County, and LiveWell Lawrence to provide the following funding level to support a SNAP Match Pilot Program for the 2014 market season (16 weeks in June-Sept). Funding is requested from:

City of Lawrence: \$10,600 Douglas County: \$10,600 LiveWell Lawrence: \$3,800

Total pilot funding for 2014: \$25,000

The \$25,000 pilot funding would provide for the following program budget:

A pilot program in 2014 will allow us to evaluate the major challenges and opportunities and the long-term sustainability model for supporting SNAP matching at farmers' markets.

Program Administration Details:

SNAP dollar for dollar match funds would be redeemed at the EBT terminal at the farmers' market. Once the Vision card is swiped, the user would indicate the amount of SNAP funds they would like to redeem. The program will provide matching funds up to \$25.00 per day. The SNAP user would then receive the initial SNAP redemption amount as well as matching funds in the form of wooden farmers' market tokens.


Funds to be put toward the dollar for dollar match program would be deposited into a programspecific Lawrence Farmers' Market bank account; LFM being a non-profit can administer the funds. EBT SNAP receipts will be turned in weekly from Cottin's Farmers' Market and Lawrence Farmers' Market and matching funds will be reimbursed to vendors from the LFM bank account. Weekly reimbursements will allow for monthly balance reports and program tracking.

An integral part of this program is informing SNAP customers that this pilot program is available beginning in June. Program information in both English and Spanish will be made available at current SNAP education sites such as Health Care Access and Heartland Community Health Center. Partnerships with local grocery stores such as Checkers or The Merc would allow for program promotion at the cash registers.

Program Design Background:

In designing this pilot program, we have drawn from the Kansas City Beans & Greens program which provides an excellent model for Douglas County to learn from and adapt to our community's needs.

The Kansas City Beans & Greens program, based out of Kansas City, Kansas and Kansas City, Missouri, is a Double Value Program which provides matching funds for those on SNAP and those receiving Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program benefits. With the match, low income residents are encouraged to shop at the local farmers' markets. A person receiving SNAP carries an EBT card, which when used at participating markets, automatically transfers funds back into the participating markets bank accounts. The market issues market tokens for the desired amount of SNAP dollars plus the match to be used with any of the participating farmer vendors at the market. Markets must submit invoices and the weekly transaction data to the Beans & Greens offices and then Beans & Greens wire transfers the match reimbursement into their bank accounts. Markets will match SNAP up to \$25.00 per transaction per week at most markets. Beans & Greens markets have experienced dramatic increases in the sales of healthy, locally produced food since their establishment in 2010. The graph below shows total food assistance spent at the participating markets prior to Beans & Greens followed by the total food assistance spent and total match in the years 2010, 2011, and 2012.



Total sales of \$630,878 over three years translates into \$1,129,271 in Local Economic Benefit.¹

Dear Commissioners:

LiveWell Lawrence supports the proposal before the Lawrence City Commission and the Douglas County Board of Commissioners to create a pilot program to incentivize Supplement Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) purchases at local farmers markets. The pilot program would match federal SNAP benefits dollar-for-dollar to provide SNAP recipients the opportunity to stretch their food budgets and purchase fresh, healthy foods sold by local food producers at both the Lawrence Farmers' Market and Cottin's Hardware Farmers Market (and conceivably the program could grow to other Farmers Markets in the future). The pilot effort is consistent with the goals of the Community Health Plan, already endorsed by the Douglas County Commission, to enhance access to healthy food in the community.

LiveWell Lawrence is a coalition of more than 100 community wellness champions, both individual citizens and representatives of organizations, who are committed to advance the goals of the Community Health Plan and specifically are working to make it easier for Douglas County residents to eat healthy foods, be physically active and live tobacco free. A primarily goal of LiveWell Lawrence is to support policy, systems and environmental changes that enhance access to healthy food among low-income residents of Lawrence and Douglas County. We know from the 2012 Community Health Assessment that:

- Many residents cite access to healthy foods as a concern, and an astonishing 4 out of 5 adults do not eat recommended amounts of fruits and vegetables each day;
- Results of the "community concerns" survey and focus groups revealed that people would like to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables more often, but often cannot afford to do so;
- SNAP enrollment/participations rates are low in Douglas County, and additional incentives are needed to encourage eligible families to apply.

This important project will greatly inform future local efforts to enhance access to healthy foods among low-income residents of Lawrence and Douglas County. LiveWell Lawrence has committed \$3,800 to this pilot program to fund program marketing and dedicated staff time. One thousand dollars is designated for the design, printing, and distribution of marketing materials, while \$2,800 will cover the staff time of a Program Coordinator who will be responsible for administering funds, monitoring and evaluating the program, and reporting evaluation results. We ask you, the Board of Commissioners, to join with us and provide the financial support necessary to make this proposal a reality.

The Lawrence-Douglas County Health Department supports the proposal before the Lawrence City Commission and the Douglas County Board of Commissioners to create a pilot program to incentivize Supplement Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) purchases at local farmers markets. The pilot program would match federal SNAP benefits dollar-for-dollar to provide SNAP recipients the opportunity to stretch their food budgets and purchase fresh, healthy foods sold by local food producers at local farmers markets.

This pilot effort is consistent with the goals of the Community Health Plan, already endorsed by the Douglas County Commission. Re: SNAP match at Lawrence Farmers' Markets

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is used by older adults in Douglas County to shop at the local farmers' markets. Healthy eating and nutrition is an issue that concerns all that provide services to seniors in our community. Providing vouchers that can be exchanged for locally grown, seasonally fresh products, older adults are encouraged to supplement their diets with foods that taste good, are nutritionally stronger and visually enticing. By providing this opportunity, seniors are physically healthier, cognitively stronger and emotionally involved with the community by actively participating in community events, ie the farmers markets. It also provides another aspect for local vendors and businesses. Older adults are comfortable in trying different products when their limited budgets are bolstered by the SNAP program vouchers.

Gayle Sigurdson, Services Coordinator at Babcock Place and Peterson Acres, comments that the program is in high demand at both sites and is eagerly anticipated by the residents. She speculates that the growth in its use is linked to better education on nutrition and the encouragement from programs such as SNAP in supporting fresh produce and the opportunity to obtain it. Janet Ikenberry, community resources manager at the Douglas County Senior Services, noted that DCSS receives calls early in the spring asking when the vouchers will be available and

how to apply for them. Again, the speculation in the increase of the questions may be due to the increase in public awareness of the program and the opportunity to purchase locally grown items.

Many older adults must make priorities in spending limited funds. By supplementing their incomes with SNAP, their diets are improved, which makes Douglas County a healthier, more active senior community. Whatever can be done to accomplish this should be encouraged and maintained.
